
### IDEAS!

- Christianity has meant several different things at different times.






#### **Israel & Palestine**


- U.N. along with British and U.S. support outline possible Jewish state in 1947 (following WW2).

#### **Israel & Palestine**

- Jewish settlement brings largely European influenced economic and cultural ideas to a region unaccustomed to them.
- Similar to colonialism, a group is forcibly occupying a space in which its ideas are dissonant with those of the current population.



#### Hope?

- Does hope sustain people bound by the Jewish faith through centuries (millennia) of oppression and abuse?
- The hope that one day they would be able to return their homeland?
- Has this aspiration been realized?
- If so, what is left to hope for?



#### Hope?

- The first Jewish settlers in the land of Palestine had abandoned hope?
- They were radical, non-religious, socialists, oppressed workers, hoping to establish a utopian space for themselves and other workers facing discrimination based on their religious upbringing.
- First kibbutz established around Sea of Galilee – 1908.



#### Hope?

- After World War II (and the Holocaust) mass immigration is undertaken by Jewish citizens of Europe.
- Newly arrived Jewish population declares the state of Israel
- Gains international recognition.
- Partly in sympathy for the atrocities endured during World War II?



- There's nothing wrong with wanting to return to a native land (Zionism)?
- It is when there is a lack of respect for the historical contingencies and alternative claims on the land that one must question the results of the Zionistic urge.
- When does Zionism become colonialism?



- Does any group have a RIGHT to live on a certain piece of land?
- Can anyone claim to be the FIRST group to live in an area (Iceland)?
- Like all humans, Europeans were originally from Africa. Does this give them the right to colonize and steal African lands from its current residents?



- Did Zionists treat the area of Palestine similar to the Europeans who came to the 'New World'?
- ... A blank slate, a desert for them to build up? Palestinians systematically rendered invisible?
- "There were some inhabitants, but they were mostly nomadic and had no permanent relationship to the land."



- This is a very ethnocentric view that considers the European notions of land use strategies as inherently good or better than others – which is of course not true.
- How much do we have a habit of associating the unfamiliar with the inferior?







- "The giving up of certain ideas is one of the most difficult changes to endure."
- How much has the animosity between Israel & Palestine (Jews & Arabs?) been bred by the maneuverings of imperial powers?





- You can't wish away hate or distrust...
- But you can isolate these sentiments and examine the historical circumstances which gave rise to them...
- There is nothing natural about the hatred between Israelis and Palestinians...





- Israelis and Palestinians are not NATURAL enemies...

- This animosity has been engineered by socio-historical circumstances (and can thus be reverse engineered)?
- "Continued tyranny does not break the will or the back of a people, and popular resistance grows, rather than lessens, with every blow..."





#### Israeli Realism:Is the wish for peace naïve?

- Should a nation base its policies on the idea that surrounding groups are intent on wiping them off the face of the Earth?
  - How "realist" is this?
- Is it insecure? Paranoid?
- Is it safe to be in constant preparedness for the worst case scenario?





#### Israeli Realism:

- ... Maybe...
- BUT, it is no way to improve relations or conditions...
  - Improvements in relations cannot be made if each side expects and assumes the absolute worst of the other.
  - Violence (war), through its culmination with a declared 'winner or loser', engenders the illusion of a resolution, conflicting interests being solved.

### **Religion // Statehood**

- The nation state of Israel IS NOT the Jewish religion.
- Just like the nation states of Syria, Lebanon, Iran, Saudi Arabia, et. al are not Islam.
- Governmental policies of nation states should not be conflated with the tenets, beliefs and mechanisms of religion.

- How much should (or could) the forms and struggles for power be connected to religious?






#### **Diaspora:**


- The dispersion of any people from its original homeland.


- The dispersion of any people from its original homeland.







# **Fundamentals** What is fundamentalism?

Can any religion be fundamentalist?

Is fundamentalism a *way of believing*, not specific to the content of the beliefs?

"Fundamentalist groups despite holding opposing views (Christianity / Islam) share much in common in how they talk, and even look."

**TABLE 1** Nine characteristics of fundamentalists groups<sup>a</sup>

- Ideological 1. Reactivity to the marginalization of religion: Fundamentalism is first and foremost a defense of a religious tradition, a tradition perceived to be eroding or under attack by the processes of modernization and secularization. Without this characteristic, a movement is not properly labeled fundamentalist.
  - 2. Selectivity: Fundamentalism is selective. Rather than simply defending a religious tradition, it selects and reshapes aspects of the tradition, particularly aspects that clearly distinguish the fundamentalists from the mainstream (see also Antoun 2001). What is more, such movements affirm and use some aspects of modernity, such as much of modern science and modern forms of communication and other technologies. Finally, certain consequences or processes of modernity are singled out for special attention and focused opposition (such as abortion for U.S. Christian fundamentalists).
  - 3. Dualistic worldview: Reality is clearly divided into the good and the evil, light and darkness, righteousness and unrighteousness.
  - 4. Absolutism and inerrancy: The text of the tradition (the Torah, Qur'an, or Bible, for example) "are of divine (inspired) origin and true and accurate in all particulars" (Almond et al. 2003, p. 96). Fundamentalist movements in religions that do not have a clear sacred text (such as Hinduism) often privilege one text (or set of texts) over others.
  - 5. Millenialism and messianism: History has a miraculous and holy end. At the end of time, at the entry or return of the hoped-for one (the messiah, the hidden Imam, etc.), suffering will end, evil will be vanquished, and believers will be victorious. The Abrahamic religions (Judaism, Christianity, and Islam) offer the most certain assurances; non-Abrahamic traditions, although tending to borrow from Abrahamic religion's "end times" certainty, lack such fully elaborated assurances.

- **Organizational 1. Elect, chosen membership:** Those in fundamentalist movements view themselves as called, selected out, set apart for their mission to defend the religious tradition.
  - Sharp boundaries: People are either in the fundamentalist group or they are not. The boundaries are clearly set; there is no confusion. One is saved, righteous, a follower of Allah, a defender of the faith, or one is not.
  - 3. Authoritarian organization: Fundamentalist movements are typically organized around charismatic leaders, with others the followers. The leader (or leaders) is viewed by the followers as specially chosen by their deity, someone with near supernatural qualities or special access to the deity, virtuous, a model for the followers, and one with special training and insight into the sacred texts.
  - 4. Behavioral requirements: As an extension of the dualistic worldview and creating sharp boundaries, behavioral requirements are both elaborate and specific. Rules about appropriate speech, dress, sexuality, drinking, eating, family formation, children, entertainment pursuits, and other behaviors are common.

#### Violent?

... Well, if fundamentally religious just means believing in your own religion, the term becomes far too broad to have any relevance.

... Does secular modernity expect the religious to tacitly acknowledge their beliefs are fictional?

## What is fundamentalism?

Relativism: the doctrine that knowledge, truth, and morality exist in relation to culture, society, or historical context, and are not absolute.

> Pluralistic: a condition or system in which two or more states, groups, principles, sources of authority, etc., coexist.

This perpetuates the perception (illusion) that violence will provide resolution to an impasse.





Secular states hold Freedom of Speech and expression up as one of its most unshakable values.

#### **Conflicting Values**

Secular: denoting attitudes, activities, or other things that have no religious or spiritual basis.


Secularism has meant: "the coercive universalization of modern morality, knowledge, law and nation-statehood."
